# ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY LOYOLA CONFERENCE

The St. Vincent de Paul Society is a worldwide organization of lay Catholics dedicated to growing closer to God by serving the poor. The Society's work and spirituality center around the Home Visit – service to those in need by going to their home, as their guest, and learning how to be of help. The material assistance we provide is vital, but the Home Visit allows us to see and touch the wounds of Christ in the lives and faces of those that we assist. Year to date in 2023, members of our Loyola Conference of the Society have visited 89 households in our parish's neighborhood and provided \$78,000 in material support to them mostly in the form of rent and utility assistance.

Our Loyola Conference also operates the Loyola Food Pantry which serves about 35 households each week. During this month of September, when we honor the Feast of St. Vincent (September 27), we are prayerfully asking for your financial support. Cash and checks (made out to The St. Vincent de Paul Society – Loyola) can be dropped in the offertory or sent to the parish office (Please use an envelope marked "St. Vincent de Paul Society"). Donations of non-perishable food items for the Food Pantry are also desperately needed and can be dropped off anytime at the Parish Office or during our Food Drives (2nd and 4th Sundays each month).

#### **Notes from Fr. Francis**

Dear Parishioners of St. Ignatius of Loyola Catholic Parish,

As you may have noticed, we have recently moved the presider's chair to the right side of the church, facing both the altar and the ambo. You may wonder why we made this change and what it means for our liturgical celebration. In this column, I would like to explain the significance of the presider's chair and how its location can enhance our worship, especially in light of my installation Mass this Sunday, where the Archbishop will be the main celebrant.

The presider's chair is more than just a place for the priest to sit during Mass. It is a symbol of his role as the head of the assembly and the one who leads us in prayer. It also signifies his mission to teach, govern, and sanctify those in his care, as a sacramental image of Christ, the head of the Mystical Body. The presider's chair is one of the three principal liturgical furnishings in the sanctuary, along with the altar and the ambo, and it should be clearly distinguished from other seats.

This Sunday, as I am installed as your pastor, the Archbishop will be the main celebrant and will occupy the presider's chair. Since our church is an ordinary parish church, the most elevated seat is the presider's chair. In a Cathedral, which is the home church of the Archbishop, the most elevated seat is called the cathedra. The cathedra is a sign of the Archbishop's authority as the chief shepherd of his diocese and a successor of the Apostles. It symbolizes the unity of the local church with the universal Church, under the guidance of the pope, who sits on the Chair of Peter in Rome. When the Archbishop sits on the cathedra, it is a vivid liturgical enactment of his role as the shepherd of the diocese, and it signifies the unity of our parish with the archdiocese and the universal Church.

The location of the presider's chair depends on several factors, such as the design of the building, the location of the tabernacle, and the communication between the priest and the people. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) states that "the best place for the chair is in a position facing the people at the head of the sanctuary" (GIRM 310), unless this is not possible or desirable for some reason. The GIRM also says that "any appearance of a throne, however, is to be avoided" (GIRM 310), as the chair should express service rather than domination.

In our church, I decided to move the presider's chair to the right side of the sanctuary for several reasons. First, I wanted to create more space behind the altar for the preparation of the gifts and movements during Mass. Second, I wanted to avoid obscuring the prominence of the tabernacle, which is in the center behind the altar, and to show reverence for Christ's presence there. Third, I wanted to align the presider's chair with both the altar and the ambo, which are on the opposite side of the sanctuary, to emphasize their connection and importance. The priest addresses the prayers of the Mass through Christ to the Father, so having the priest face the crucifix on the altar as he prays these prayers on behalf of the congregation draws the assembly into those prayers rather than giving the impression that the priest is praying the prayers to the congregation. Fourth, by bringing the chair out more in front, we provide the sense of the presider being at the head and leading the assembled congregation.

We hope that this change, and the deeper understanding of the roles symbolized by the presider's chair and the cathedra, will help us to appreciate more deeply the meaning and beauty of our liturgy, and to participate more fully and actively in it. Let us pray for our priests who sit on this chair, and for our archbishop, that they may be faithful servants of Christ and His Church.
