Notes from Fr. Francis

Dear Parishioners of St. Ignatius,

The Peace of Christ be with you!

As we come together to participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, we immerse ourselves in the timeless liturgy, designed to elevate our souls towards the Transcendent. The readings for this 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A, speak with an unerring voice to the perennial concerns of human existence: the nature of forgiveness, the obligations of community, and the transformative power of Divine Love.

In the Gospel according to St. Matthew, we hear of Peter asking Christ, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive?" (Mt 18:21). The Lord's response—that we should forgive not seven times, but seventy-seven times—reveals the inexhaustible nature of God's mercy and provides a profound invitation to compassion and reconciliation for our community.

It seems apt to ponder this Gospel teaching as we also consider the evolving identity of our beloved St. Ignatius Parish. For nearly a century, the Society of Jesus has steered the course of this parish community. The Jesuits, with their charism deeply rooted in the intellectual, social, and spiritual facets of the Church's mission, have imprinted on St. Ignatius a certain character—one emphasizing social justice, community outreach, and intellectual curiosity. And for this, we are profoundly grateful.

However, just as each Religious Order in the Church brings its own charism, it is vital to understand that territorial parishes evolve and, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, adapt to address the specific spiritual needs of the people within the territory. We find ourselves at a juncture where the community of St. John is being called to continue guiding St. Ignatius Parish using the gifts that are theirs. My Religious Community, the Congregation of Saint John, with our formation and charism, have received a spiritual compass, so to speak, which is different from the Jesuits, but nonetheless leads to the same heavenly homeland. Br. Michael Paul did a presentation on our Congregation and Charism that I would highly recommend watching if you were unable to attend (Link below).

The ways of God are mysterious: why it is that He leads us in a certain way at a given point in our lives, and then begins to lead us in a different way, accords with His wisdom and providence. The truths and spiritual benefits that have enlightened and filled us while being led in a particular way are a permanent part of who we are. Far from being a negation of the past, a new way of being led opens up new horizons and perspectives into the apostolic tradition and the sacramental life of the Church which God Himself wants to provide and build on our spiritual foundation.

Consider our journey together as the maturing of a robust vine, rooted deeply in the rich soil of apostolic tradition and the wisdom of the Church. This vine has been nurtured by the diligent care of those who have come before us, each bringing their own unique gifts and charisms to facilitate its growth. Now, as we enter a new season, we are called to further enrich the soil, not by uprooting what has already been planted, but by adding nutrients that honor and complement the long history. In doing so, the vine not only continues to flourish but also produces fruit that is even more abundant and sweet.

In this process of enriching our community, let us remember the profound message of today's Gospel readings on the boundless nature of God's mercy and forgiveness. Our faith, bequeathed to us by the Apostles and sustained by the Church through centuries, transcends individual charisms and trends of any era. This timeless faith, calling us to unending love and perpetual forgiveness, remains as relevant today as it was in the times of St. Ignatius of Loyola and St. John the Apostle. The Gospel challenges us to deepen our understanding, expand our capacity for love, and fortify our commitment to the teachings of the Church.

I invite you all to be active participants in this period of transformation: Engage in the sacramental life, partake in the study of the Faith, immerse yourself in the rich liturgical traditions, and offer your prayers for the spiritual growth of our community. As we continue this incredible journey together, let us bear in mind that we are all pilgrims progressing toward the same ultimate destination: union with God, Who is the Alpha and the Omega, the Eternal Truth Who commands us to forgive, to love, and to serve.



On Catechetical Sunday, our community honors everyone called to teach the faith.

We lift up our Religious Education and RCIA catechists, parents, grandparents, and everyone else who bears witness to the faith and supports children or adults on their journeys of inquiry, sacramental preparation, and spiritual encounter.

Let us mark the new year through our Ignatian tradition of introspective, personal prayer. Please make time this week to pray this Family Examen from *God in All Things* (https://godinallthings.com/prayer/family-examen/)

Many pray the Examen on their own, reflecting on their own life in the last 24 hours. This Examen's focus is on being a part of a family. You may pray it with your family or on your own. If prayed with family members it might be fruitful to share your prayer experience with one another at the conclusion of the prayer.

When God created human beings, we became part of the Family of Creation. The Bible even says we are adopted into God's family. Sit with this reality for a few moments: *Each cell in my body, each chromosome, and strand of DNA is amazingly connected to God's Family of Creation*. And consider all of us as descendants of Abraham, one of the countless stars of his future children, bound up in relationship, a people chosen by God. Now let us consider our own immediate family, made up of parents, spouses, children, sisters, and brothers. *I bring their faces into my mind's eye, and with God, gaze upon their faces with love. Regardless of their faults, they have been given to me. They are my family.*

What are some important moments I've shared with my family? I let them arise in my mind naturally and relish those moments in my heart. Why were those moments so important? Now I consider my role in my family. Am I a son or a daughter? A mother or a father? A sister or a brother? A husband or a wife? In what ways have I made my family closer? And in what ways have I caused fractures among us? My immediate family is an important part of the larger human family contributing to the good of creation. How can I contribute to a more loving family? What do I need to ask God for as I hope for deeper union and harmony within my closest relationships?

Let us close with a prayer for families: Heavenly Father, Please shine your light upon my family. Give us strength to overcome all of the difficulties that we are dealing with now and protect us against any and all problems we may encounter in the future. O Lord, please bring us together as we are meant to be. May the love that binds us only grow stronger as we fulfill the destiny you have laid out for us. Grant my family forgiveness for any sins we have committed. May we also forgive one another Lord, as it is sometimes difficult to do. Bless us Lord, In your name I pray, Amen.

If you're praying this with your family you may want to take this time to share your experience of prayer. Or, spend this time speaking to Jesus—a member of your own family—about what you experienced.
