PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parishioners of St. Ignatius,

Peace be with you.

In this week's column, I am pleased to share positive developments from recent discussions within our parish community. The topic at hand is the Black Lives Matter sign that was previously situated at the rear of our church. Following a period of prayerful discernment and numerous constructive conversations, we are embarking on a spiritually enriching path forward: we will lift our prayers during the Universal Prayer on Sundays, specifically invoking God's grace to eradicate racism from the hearts of humanity. I am also excited to announce the initiation of a comprehensive study aimed at incorporating sacred art that both honors the dignity of black lives and resonates with the timeless architecture that has sanctified our worship space for nearly a century.

To clarify why we're making this change, it's important to remember that the Church has two main roles: it's a place for spiritual growth and a community that aims to do good in the world. Our faith teaches us to follow Christ by loving openly, serving others, and seeking justice. But in all we do, our main goal must always be the salvation of souls. This mission is guided by the Church's long-standing teachings, traditions, and wisdom.

The phrase 'Black Lives Matter', a justified outcry in response to the killing of young African Americans, has become deeply connected with not just the call to end systemic racism, but also a broad array of social and political ideologies. Some of these ideologies are not congruent with the tenets of our faith. Thus, displaying the sign within our church could potentially

sow confusion about what the Church teaches on complex social issues, or what our community understands by the phrase "Black Lives Matter" as separate from the organization with the same name. This is a serious concern, as we, the Body of Christ, must be ever vigilant against confusing the spiritual mission of the Church with temporal ideologies, no matter how well-intended they may be.

For this reason, we will include a regular universal prayer intention at Sunday Masses for an end to racism. In the Liturgy, prayer serves as a powerful conduit through which divine grace flows, converting hearts and inspiring action. It is through prayer, the sacraments, and especially the Eucharist that we connect most deeply with God, where we converse with the Creator, and where we derive the strength to love and serve as Christ did. Prayer is the lifeblood of the Church, because it aligns our will with God's, fortifying us with the grace to tackle the challenges of our fallen world. The most powerful thing we can *do* is pray.

Sacred art has long been a cornerstone in how we worship and pray as a Church community. In harmony with the historic and cherished architecture of St. Ignatius Church, we're embarking on a study to identify art that not only complements our sanctuary but also honors the experiences and struggles of Black people. This endeavor transcends mere aesthetics; it serves as a spiritual path to deepen our understanding of God's profound beauty and love. As Pope Francis insightfully noted, 'The role of art is to put a thorn in the heart,' challenging us to confront and contemplate the divine mysteries of our faith. Sacred art often encapsulates narratives of struggle and divine triumph—from the life of Christ to the stories of saints and martyrs, revealing how God's love prevails over suffering and evil.

In this endeavor, I am reminded of the unique contributions of black saints like St. Benedict the Moor, St. Martin de Porres, Servant of God Julia Greeley, and St. Josephine Bakhita, who surmounted the debilitating chains of racial prejudice to become powerful witnesses to God's love. It is this kind of testimony that could be visually encapsulated within our church, showing the emancipating power of holiness and grace which lead to the transformation of suffering into redemption and union with God.

In closing, I invite all members of our community to be prayerfully involved in this process. Racism is a grievous sin against the dignity of the human person, and fighting it requires the combined efforts of the entire Mystical Body of Christ. Yet, as we engage with the injustices of the temporal world, let us not forget that our ultimate destination is eternal life with God. All our actions, however oriented towards social justice they may be, should lead us and others towards heaven, our eternal homeland.

May the grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God the Father, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit guide us in all our endeavors.
