PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear St. Ignatius of Loyola Parishioners,

As we gather this Sunday, the scriptures invite us into a reflection on stewardship through the imagery of a vineyard. The First Reading from Isaiah (5:1-7) presents a vineyard that, despite the owner's diligent care, yielded wild grapes. The

Gospel of Matthew (21:33-43) shares a parable of tenants who failed to give the landowner his due share of the harvest. These readings evoke a spiritual metaphor for our beloved St. Ignatius Parish, a vineyard entrusted to our care by the Divine Landowner.

In the past months, our parish has been navigating through a transitional period, and the weekly offertory reflects these challenging times. However, as we prepare for the colder season, our collective stewardship is vital to ensure the warmth of our church, both physically and spiritually. Our current circumstances call for a re-evaluation and, perhaps, a re-commitment to our financial contributions, considering the rising costs over the years.

The upkeep of both our church building and the Family Center have incurred costly, but necessary repairs. A renovation that will enable the Congregation of Saint John to move on site will be done as cost effectively as possible but will still have a significant financial impact. The eventual restoration of our church's windows and flooring, alongside other essential repairs on the exterior brickwork, are not merely aesthetic endeavors, but spiritual investments that enhance our worship and witness to the wider community. Our forthcoming neighborhood outreach initiatives and other pastoral activities also depend on our financial stewardship.

The Second Reading from Philippians (4:6-9) encourages us to turn our anxieties into prayers and petitions, with thanksgiving. Let us prayerfully consider how we might increase our offertory giving, reflecting a generosity that matches the current needs of our parish. The Apostle Paul assures us that the peace of God will guard our hearts and minds if we do so.

As we approach the altar this Sunday, let us reflect on the blessings we have received and our call to share these blessings with our parish community. Our generous response to this call of stewardship will enable St. Ignatius Parish to continue being a beacon of faith, hope, and love in our neighborhood.

We invite all who are able to consider participating in our upcoming outreach initiatives. For those interested, please contact the parish office for more information. Our communal efforts, anchored in faith and fueled by love, will ensure that our parish vineyard bears fruit abundantly, to the glory of God.

May the peace of Christ reign in our hearts, and may our shared commitment to stewardship reflect the abundance of God's grace among us.



Let us continue celebrating St. Francis of Assisi (Feast Day Oct. 4) and his legacy

In his famous *Commedia*, Dante (d. 1321) describes Francis of Assisi's (d. 1226) love for the marginalized as a great passion that drove him to pursue Lady Poverty, the embodiment of the poor, throughout his life, eventually marrying her. From *Paradiso*, Canto 11:

"he began to make the earth feel from his great virtue some comfort...for, for sake of a lady, while still a youth...he ran...from day to day he loved her more ardently...**She, deprived of her first husband, for eleven hundred years and more, despised and obscure, even till him had remained unwooed**; so that, where Mary remained below, she with Christ mounted on the cross."

Last week, Pope Francis reminded us that Lady Poverty is once again neglected. In *Laudate Deum*, his follow-up climate-change exhortation to *Laudato Si'* (2015), he connected the fate of marginalized people at risk of harm or death to greed:

"This situation has to do not only with physics or biology, but also with the economy...The mentality of maximum gain at minimal cost, disguised in terms of reasonableness, progress and illusory promises, makes impossible any sincere concern for our common home and any real preoccupation about assisting the poor and the needy discarded by our society."
