PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parishioners of St. Ignatius,

As we approach the 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time, the liturgical readings draw our attention to themes of vigilance and preparedness. The Parable of the Ten Virgins (Matthew

25:1-13) provides a profound reflection as we consider the four last things: death, judgment, heaven, and hell. In the heart of this parable lies a call to readiness—not through fear, but through the faithful reception of and preparedness for grace, ready to meet our Lord at any moment.

This month, we are blessed with the celebration of a saint who personifies the contemplative preparation for the afterlife: St. Gertrude the Great. Her life, dedicated to mystical prayer and

devotion, offers us profound insights into the oftenmisunderstood concept of Purgatory. St. Gertrude, whose feast day we celebrate on November 16th, received visions which underlined the importance of prayers for the souls in Purgatory. She reminds us that Purgatory, rather than a place of punitive suffering, is a state of purification where souls, assured of their eventual entrance into heaven, are prepared to meet God face to face.

In her visions, St. Gertrude saw this preparation as an intimate process, one that involves both the community of the faithful on earth and the communion of saints. We are called to assist these souls with our prayers and sacrifices, an embodiment of the Church's triumphant and militant dimensions working in harmony.

Our Requiem Mass on November 17th is a vivid enactment of this reality. It is a liturgical embrace of hope, where we, as the Body of Christ, unite to offer the sacrifice of the Mass for our beloved departed. It is here that we encounter the Paschal Mystery in its fullness, acknowledging our mortality while celebrating the promise of resurrection.

Connecting these thoughts to the readings, we see the wise virgins were prepared with oil in their lamps, symbolizing the state of grace necessary for meeting the Bridegroom. We, too, keep our lamps alight not only by living in a state of grace but also by aiding those in the state of purification. Our prayers are the oil that fuels the lamps of the souls in Purgatory, aiding them on their journey towards the celestial banquet.

The Parable of the Ten Virgins thus becomes not only a cautionary tale but an invitation to partake in the deep solidarity of the Church. It is a reminder to live a life of vigilance—a life characterized by prayer, reception of the sacraments, and acts of charity.

In the solemnity of the Requiem Mass, we find a tangible expression of this solidarity. The Gregorian chants, beautiful Polyphony, the prayers of intercession, and the Eucharistic sacrifice are all offered for those who have gone before us. We stand together, bridging the temporal with the eternal, the physical with the spiritual, embodying the reality that though the body may die, love — the love we show in prayer for the faithful departed — never dies.

As we continue our earthly pilgrimage, let us hold fast to the wisdom of St. Gertrude the Great, remembering our call to aid the souls in Purgatory. May our Requiem Mass be a profound testament to our faith in the Resurrection, a beacon of hope, and a generous act of mercy towards those who await the face-to-face vision of God.

Let us pray for the grace to be vigilant and prepared, emulating the wise virgins, as we anticipate not only the coming of Christ but the eternal joy that awaits us all after our time of purification, trusting in the intercession of saints like Gertrude the Great and the mercy of our loving God.
