PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parishioners and Friends.

As we approach Thanksgiving, our hearts are naturally drawn to gratitude, a sentiment that finds deep resonance in our faith. This Sunday, the Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, presents us with profound insights into thankfulness, additionally this year we are celebrating the feast of Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Nov. 21st) and St. Cecilia (Nov. 22nd) leading up to Thanksgiving Day.

In our liturgical readings, we are invited to a deeper appreciation of our faith and God's gifts. The prophecy of Daniel, "But the wise shall shine brightly like the splendor of the firmament," speaks to a time of distress followed by eternal reward for the wise and just. This passage, highlighting resilience in adversity, encourages thankfulness for God's promise of salvation and a hopeful outlook towards eternity. Such hope in the face of trials fosters a spirit of gratitude, urging us to find joy and purpose even in life's challenges, as we anticipate the ultimate fulfillment of God's promises.

The Letter to the Hebrews offers another profound reflection, stating, "For by one offering he has made perfect forever those who are being consecrated." This passage reminds us of Christ's ultimate sacrifice, which perfected those being consecrated. Here, we are urged to express our gratitude for the gift of redemption. It challenges us to live in the light of this grace, embodying the virtues Christ exemplified. This gratitude goes beyond mere words, calling us to a life of service, love, and self-sacrifice, mirroring Christ's own life and his ultimate act of love on the cross.

Finally, the Gospel of Mark vividly describes the end times and Christ's return, urging, "But of that day or hour, no one knows." This passage emphasizes the importance of vigilance and preparedness. In this context, thankfulness becomes a recognition of the transience of earthly life and the importance of spiritual vigilance. It encourages us to live each day with purpose and mindfulness, aware of the fleeting nature of our

earthly existence and the enduring promise of eternal life. This perspective invites us to cherish each moment, using our time wisely in service and love, as we await the fulfillment of God's kingdom.

In the midst of these reflections, we are also called to remember the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Celebrated on November 21st, this day recalls Mary's complete dedication to God from a young age. Tradition holds that Mary - privately and in her heart - from the very moment she was able to understand the great gift of grace she received, offered herself back to her Creator, dedicating her life to God with gratitude. This act, symbolized by presenting herself in the Temple, is a testament to the grace she perceived in her life from its earliest stages. Mary's life, marked by a profound openness to God's will, exemplifies the purest form of gratitude - a life lived in service and dedication to the Divine. As we reflect on her presentation, let us seek to emulate her gratitude and dedication in our own lives.

St. Cecilia, whose feast we celebrate November 22, lived a life full of gratitude and unwavering faith, making her an exemplary figure during this season of Thanksgiving. Cecilia, a young Christian of noble birth, was betrothed to a Roman named Valerian whom she converted to Christianity. Her story, marked by profound faith and courage, culminates in her martyrdom, a testament to her steadfast dedication to God. After being struck on the neck, Cecilia survived for three days, during which she requested that her home be transformed into a church.

Her life is not just a tale of resilience and faith but also of joyous celebration through music. Known for singing in her heart and sometimes with her voice, St. Cecilia is a symbol of the Church's conviction that good music is an integral part of the liturgy, holding a place of great value. Her association with music reminds us that our expressions of faith and gratitude can be beautifully manifested in various forms of art, particularly in those that uplift the spirit and glorify God.

St. Cecilia's story encourages us to find in every moment, whether joyous or challenging, an opportunity to give thanks to God. Her life was a symphony of thankfulness, expressed not only through her martyrdom but also through her joyous embrace of music as a form of prayer and worship. In her, we find a powerful example of how gratitude and faith can coexist, even in the most trying circumstances, and how they can be expressed in unique and impactful ways.

In this Thanksgiving season, let us look to these exemplary women, the Mother of God and St. Cecilia, as models of living a life of gratitude. Their lives teach us that true thankfulness is found in a heart fully open to God, ready to respond with love and service. May we embrace this season not just as a time to count our blessings but as an invitation to live a life marked by spiritual alertness, dedication, and a symphony of gratitude, following the examples set before us.
