

PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parishioners,

As we approach the Third Sunday of Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday, our hearts and our church are filled with a sense of joyful anticipation. The use of the color rose in our liturgical vestments is not just a mark of the Church's rich tradition but a visual reminder of the joy that is central to our faith, especially as we draw nearer to the celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord. We turn the corner this Sunday from preparation through repentance, considering the end of time and the Last Judgment, to the preparation of joyful hope for the birth of the Savior.

Gaudete Sunday derives its name from the Introit of the Mass: "Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, gaudete" (Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say, rejoice). This ancient chant, rich in history and significance, captures the essence of this liturgical time. The word 'Gaudete' itself, meaning 'rejoice' in Latin, is a command, an invitation, and a reminder all at once. It beckons us to find joy in the Lord, amidst all circumstances, as we await the fulfillment of His promises.

The Introit, a significant component of the Mass, has a rich history. Originally, it involved the singing of an entire psalm as the priest entered to celebrate Mass. This practice can be traced back to the early centuries of the Church. The psalm was initially sung responsorially, with an antiphon repeated by all at intervals while a solo singer chanted the psalm's words.

This evolved into a form where two groups of singers alternated, with the antiphon sung only at the beginning and end. This change is attributed to Pope Celestine I (422–432), and Pope Gregory I (590–604), after whom Gregorian chant is named, composed several antiphons for use with the Entrance psalm.

Over time, the practice was streamlined. If the singing of the psalm was not completed by the time the Entrance procession arrived at the altar, the singers would move directly to the Gloria Patri and the final repetition of the antiphon. Eventually, only the opening verse of the psalm was retained, along with the Gloria Patri, preceded and followed by the antiphon. This form of the Introit was solidified following the Council of Trent.

The 1970 revision of the Roman Missal envisaged the possibility of singing the entire psalm associated with the antiphon, although this was not made obligatory. In contemporary Catholic usage, the introit corresponds to the Entrance Antiphon and is sung or recited audibly before the Sign of the Cross at the beginning of Mass.

In line with Sacrosanctum Concilium, the Second Vatican Council's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, we continue to integrate chant into our liturgies. The Council emphasized that Gregorian chant, as the proper chant of the Roman Rite, holds a principal place in liturgical services. This is not merely a matter of tradition, but of deep spiritual significance. Chant, with its meditative and solemn qualities, elevates our worship, aligning our hearts closer to the sacred mysteries we celebrate.

The incorporation of chant in our liturgical celebrations is a conscious effort to deepen our connection with the centuries-old traditions of our faith. In a world that is ever-changing and often chaotic, these chants are a source of solace and stability, grounding us in our rich Catholic heritage.

The antiphon's words are carefully chosen to relate to the theme of the feast day or celebration, often reflecting the liturgical readings of the Mass. For Gaudete Sunday, the antiphon and the readings emphasize the joy of expectation and the imminent arrival of Christ. This sense of joy and gladness is further highlighted by the use of rose-colored vestments and the relaxation of penitential practices, drawing a parallel with Laetare Sunday in Lent.

As we don the rose vestments this Gaudete Sunday, let us embrace the joy that the Church calls us to. Let the ancient chants remind us of the unchanging nature of our faith and the eternal joy found in Christ. May our hearts be ever open to the profound message of Advent, as we await with hopeful expectation the birth of our Savior.

OPPORTUNITY FOR PLENARY INDULGENCE

The Capuchins are pleased to announce that a plenary indulgence has been granted from December 8, 2023, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, until February 2, 2024, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord.

The indulgence may be obtained by visiting a church served by Franciscans and praying before the nativity scene set up there. This indulgence was approved by Pope Francis in order to "promote the spiritual renewal of the faithful and increase the life of grace." The only churches in Colorado where you can receive this indulgence in Denver are St. Patrick's and Annunciation.

Those who are sick or unable to participate physically can obtain the indulgence by offering their sufferings up to the Lord, or by "carrying out practices of piety."

This indulgence may be received under the usual conditions: detachment from all sin (even venial), prayer for the intentions of the pope, and receiving sacramental confession and holy communion within 20 days before or after the act.
