Pastor's Column

The Scripture readings of this Sunday bring out quite a striking difference between the awful suffering which Job undergoes and the boundless, healing compassion ushered in by Jesus. This contrast sets the scene for a more in-depth examination of spiritual discernment, particularly in the light of the first two rules of Spiritual Discernment given by St Ignatius of Loyola. As we approach the Lenten season, these readings and reflections can be of tremendous assistance.

The first rule of St. Ignatius speaks directly into the circumstance of being caught in a relentless cycle of sin whereby the enemy of our human nature dangles the allure of ephemeral pleasures to ensnare souls further into vice and sin. This dark strategy for inducing sin, and suppressing human happiness cuts sharply against the narrative of Job - a man beset by unspeakable losses and physical afflictions, yet not due to personal sin.

Job's story, instead, opens a window into the dark night of the soul wherein reason and conscience become the light and path through which the good spirit does invite

reflection, and repentance, and ultimately deeper communion with the divine. Job's insistent questioning and refusal to turn away from faith based on his misery only echoes the good spirit's work in stirring conscience towards growth and enlightenment amidst any trial.

The second rule deals with the journey of those who strive to cleanse their sins, and from there ascend to better in their divine service. This is what Ignatius exposes here, the inverse tactics of the spiritual forces at play: the evil spirit seeks to dishearten, to place obstacles and sow doubts aiming thereby to halt one's spiritual momentum. This is vividly counterbalanced in the Gospel where Jesus through works of healing and words of liberation manifests the promise of the good spirit for strength, consolation, and peace. That living testimony to the role of the good spirit in facilitating our spiritual pathway is the ministry of Jesus which urges us to persist in our quest for holiness in spite of the hurdles.

These Ignatian principles of discernment are not just some theological constructs but practical tools to help us grapple with the complexities of our spiritual lives: all the more important as we consider how we will live

this Lent. The first rule summons us towards watchfulness and awareness of that pull of seduction by sin, alerting us towards re-orientation of our lives to truth, purity, and divine love. This second rule evokes a note of hope, in that it reminds us that because of our efforts to grow closer to God we will meet with resistance, yet not without divine assistance of consolation and grace to press forward.

Join us in our ongoing Formation session at 6:30pm on Monday evenings as we explore these Ignatian rules for discernment together. This timing of this gathering is very appropriate - (re)honing our spiritual discernment so that we may have a fruitful Lent. The rules spur us to a more intense interior life as we examine experiences of consolation and desolation, in order to better recognize the movements of the spirits within our heart and to discern more clearly the direction in which God is moving us.

May we find ourselves drawn into the heart of God, strengthened in our determination to navigate the ebb and flow of our spiritual life, and inspired to be Jesus' healing compassion for others.


