### Pastor's Column Dear Parishioners,

As we delve deeper into the Lenten season, our thoughts and prayers increasingly orient toward the core of our Christian faith: the Paschal Mystery. This profound mystery, which encapsulates Jesus Christ's passion, death, resurrection, and ascension, stands as a beacon of hope and renewal for all believers. It beautifully illustrates the divine principle that from death springs new life, a theme that resonates deeply during this penitential period.

The readings selected for the Fifth Sunday of Lent Year B offer a rich tapestry of scriptural insights that highlight the multifaceted dimensions of the Paschal Mystery. In Jeremiah, we encounter the promise of a new covenant, distinct from that made with the ancestors. This covenant will be written on the heart, signifying a transformative relationship between God and His people, one that is intimate and personal. This prophetic vision anticipates the radical renewal brought about through Christ's death and resurrection, establishing a new covenant sealed by His blood, where our sins are not only forgiven but forgotten, and where God's law becomes an intrinsic part of our being.

Echoing Jeremiah's message of inner transformation, the Psalmist's plea for a clean heart (Psalm 51) touches upon our longing for redemption and purification. This heartfelt cry to God for mercy and renewal underscores the Paschal Mystery's power to cleanse and rejuvenate our spirits. It serves as a reminder that through the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection, we are offered the chance to start anew, shedding the burdens of our past misdeeds and embracing a future filled with hope and grace.

The letter to the Hebrews deepens our contemplation of the Paschal Mystery by focusing on Christ's obedience and suffering. This passage not only underscores the salvific nature of Christ's passion but also invites us to partake in His sufferings as a means of achieving eternal salvation. It presents obedience to God's will, even in the face of suffering, as a pathway to spiritual perfection and union with Christ. Through His perfect obedience, Christ becomes the source of eternal salvation for all who follow Him, teaching us that our own trials and tribulations can be transformative, leading us closer to God.

The Gospel according to John offers a compelling narrative where Jesus predicts His death as a prerequisite for generating abundant life. His analogy of the grain of wheat that must die to produce fruit encapsulates the essence of the Paschal Mystery. Jesus' forthcoming death is portrayed not as an end but as a beginning, a sacrificial act that will bring forth new life for many. This passage invites us to embrace the paradoxical truth that true life in Christ often requires us to let go of our earthly attachments and desires, to "die" to ourselves in order to live more fully in Him.

In reflecting upon these readings, we are invited to ponder the profound implications of the Paschal Mystery in our own lives. It challenges us to see beyond the immediate pain and loss, recognizing that in God's divine economy, endings are often the precursors to new beginnings. Just as the harshness of winter gives way to the rebirth of spring, so too does the Paschal Mystery promise us a spiritual springtime, a resurrection of our hearts and souls.



## **Timeless Treasured Talents of St. Ignatius Loyola** Mary McEnany

Three beloved sisters entered Loyola for the first time, walked halfway up the center aisle, and sensed, simultaneously, they had found their parish. Mary McEnany believes it was the grace of her sister, Barbara Sercely, that brought her and their sister, Kelly, to what they would promptly embrace as their cherished parish.

Since 2005, the McEnany sisters of faith embraced the Jesuit motto—"Men and Women for

Others". In fellowship ministries Kelly and Mary helped organize and perfect Loyola's grace-

filled services, including the Elders' Luncheon, Christmas baskets, St. Ignatius Feast Day annual picnic, Our Lady of Guadalupe liturgies, and the 90th Anniversary Celebration.

Mary, a doctor of psychiatry, served as a Veterans' Administration attending staff physician and through her private practice until her retirement in 2018. She is a Eucharistic Minister, for both church and homebound, lector, and altar server. Mary credits her sisters with igniting her love and calling for Ignatian Spirituality—Light Works to her mission as ISP spiritual director.

Occasionally coming for Mass, Mary says she experiences a glowing Community: "I see my fellow parishioners shining as if their halos were illuminating them, generating a lovely sense of warmth, joy, and peace—physically, emotionally."

The sisters continue to serve Loyola— Barbara prays in Dallas again, Kelly among our 'Mighty Cloud of Witnesses', and Mary prays her Suscipe, "Help me know what I am to do for the greater good, for Your glory in this moment."
