Pastor's Column

Dear Parishioners.

Today, Palm Sunday, we draw close to Jesus for His final week. The mystery of our Redemption plays out in the concrete words and actions of the sacred liturgies we participate in today and during the Triduum: the Mass of the Lord's Supper, the Office of the Passion, and the Easter Vigil of the Lord's Resurrection. The mystery of our Redemption is revealed in a purposefully tangible way through these liturgies, so that the reality of it may occur to us; not merely words or ideas. This week is not just a remembrance but a vivid re-presentation of the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ, through which we are invited to contemplate the profound value of suffering in the Christian life, especially as it brings us closer to Christ crucified and therefore to our salvation.

Pope John Paul II, in his encyclical Redemptoris Missio, reminds us of the universal call to participate in the mystery of Redemption. He emphasizes the importance of missionary activity (being sent), which is not just a matter of physical outreach but, in its essence, a spiritual willingness to associate with suffering humans, so that they may be redeemed.

This mission is one that every Christian is called to undertake, not as a solitary traveler but as part of the mystical body of Christ. Our mission, then, especially during Holy Week, is to allow the grace of God to transform us, to let the events of Jesus' last days on earth become not just historical facts but realities that shape our lives and our understanding of suffering, redemption, and salvation. In reflecting on how we can emulate Christ to best continue his redemptive work, I'd like to share with you a short meditation from Benedict the XVI on the "powerfully humble" character of our Redeemer:

Jesus entered the Holy City seated on a donkey that did not even belong to him, for he had none of his own. In doing so, he recalled the prophecy of Zechariah that was well known to his people: "Rejoice greatly, O daughter Zion!... Lo, your king comes to you; ... humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey" (Zech 9:9). Horses, which at that time symbolized military power, as the armored tank does today, would disappear. The true king of Israel would not come on a horse, would not join in the struggle of the world powers; he had no desire to seize power for himself; he would ride on a donkey, the symbol of peace, the animal useless for military purposes, the animal of the poor. His entry into Jerusalem on a borrowed donkey is both the symbol of earthly impotence and the fulfillment of the prophetic promise.... But what, then, is Jesus' Kingdom? The borrowed donkey is an expression of earthly impotence, but, at the same time, the expression of perfect confidence in the power of God, which is represented in Jesus. He did not set up a kingdom of his own alongside the Kingdom of God. He was content to bear witness to God's Kingdom. His nothing was his all. He did not stand for earthly power, but for truth, justice, love—for God.

The Kingdom of God has a precarious existence in this world. But it is only by reason of this Kingdom that the world becomes a fit place to live, a human place. It is not revolutionaries who make the world a human place—not even the best-intentioned of them; all they have to contribute is blood and shambles. What makes it possible for us to live in the world are goodness, truth, faithfulness, and the certainty that God himself is all of these. What makes it possible for us to live is the faith that God is like Jesus Christ, that Jesus is God; that he, the man on the borrowed donkey, is the true King, the true and ultimate power in the world. Today's feast challenges us to lead lives dedicated to this power—to the King. Thy Kingdom come!





What is the Pontifical Good Friday Collection?

It supports the people of the Holy Land and the pilgrims that visit.

At the request of the Holy Father, the Franciscans of the Holy Land promote the Pontifical Good Friday Collection in the United States and other parts of the world. Funds are distributed at the direction of the Vatican's Congregation for the Oriental Churches. A portion of the funds are directly allocated to the educational and ecclesial projects in the Middle East. The rest of the funds collected in the United States and a number of other countries support the ministries and programs entrusted by the Holy See to the Holy Land Franciscans. The Franciscans have served in the Holy Land for 800 years.

The Pontifical Good Friday Collection provides, Humanitarian, Liturgical, Pastoral, Archaeological, Charitable, Educational services, as well as care for the Holy Places.
