

Pastor's Column

Dear Parishioners.

In the weeks of the Easter Season, in addition to allowing the reality of the resurrection to set in, we are simultaneously guided by the Liturgy to turn our gaze to the promised Spirit of God, the Paraclete, the Holy Spirit. I came across a thoughtful meditation from Pope Benedict XVI on the third person of the Trinity in his short work, "The God of Jesus Christ: Meditations on the Triune God." I'll be sharing it along with some of my own (brief) commentary over these weeks of Easter. The benefit and relevance of this meditation has to do with the role of the Holy Spirit in the Trinity, in the Church (and its history), and in us as Christians.

It would be handy to be able to "pin down" the Holy Spirit, but the more we do (or the more we try to) the less whatever we're left with resembles Him. We know that the Eucharist is truly Jesus body, blood, soul and divinity. But Confirmation isn't the Holy Spirit, nor is it the first time we are touched by the Holy Spirit or receive the Holy Spirit. We also receive the Holy Spirit when we are baptized - He is the one at work in the waters. We receive the Holy Spirit during a sacramental confession - the sins we confess are replaced by His presence.

Jesus says, "The wind blows where it wills, and you hear the sound of it, but you know neither where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit."

Pope Benedict XVI begins his meditation describing the difficulty the Church has faced in speaking well about the Holy Spirit. The Spirit is so closely associated with vitality, authenticity, and charisma that it seems to resist - by definition- institution, rules, formality, and many other traits that are synonymous with the Church. The desire to have a Church "of the Spirit" is not new.

In fact, this is a recurring theme in church history and among believers - Pope Benedict XVI presents a couple of failed attempts, an inimitable Saint who succeeded, and some Theological insights that shed light on the mystery of the Third Person. We'll begin this week with his introduction and the first important - but heretical - "pneumatologist."

"We believe in God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, the triune God. But while we are able to say rather a lot about the Father and the Son, the Holy Spirit has largely remained the unknown God. In the course of Church history, there have always been those who appealed to the Holy Spirit, but the result of the movements that arose in this way was often that the Church spoke even less about the Holy Spirit.

This begins with Mani (216–274 or 277) (2), the father of Manichaeism, who claimed to be the incarnation of the Paraclete—the Holy Spirit—and therefore superior to Christ. A dark shadow spreads from there through the entire Church history of the Middle Ages: the arrogant claim to a higher holiness, which, despite all attempts at resistance, darkened the faith of Christendom.

It was hard for the Church to throw off this inheritance. Nourished by other roots, the "Spirit" movement of Montanism found many adherents in the Church in Asia Minor in the second century. Its most eloquent Western representative was the great ecclesiastical writer Tertullian (ca. 160–after 220). The Montanist message led him to despise the 'sinful Church', an attitude that ended in arrogance and a gloomy moralism." (1)




Upcoming Concert at St. Ignatius


